Fockerby Village sign

Thanks to Jiggy Lloyds’ brother-in-law Nigel Sykes, there is some information about the train that features on the road sign welcoming people to Fockerby. Thought it might be of interest:

"The picture on it is distinctive and highly appropriate, being the classic (possibly only?) photo of the Sentinel steam railcar in its original livery that was bought in 1930, in an effort to reduce the costs of passenger service on the Axholme Joint Railway. In this it was not sufficiently successful, and the line was closed to passengers in July 1933 whereupon the railcar was transferred to the LNER, which already had about 80 similar vehicles. This car spent most of the rest of its life around Wigan and was withdrawn in 1944.

These railcars used the boilers and engines that Sentinel had developed for its range of steam lorries. My father used to travel from Selby to school in Drax on one of them, and this route (the direct line from Selby to Goole, closed in 1964) was one of the last two to use them. The final Sentinel in this country was a Selby resident, surviving just long enough to move

from LNER to British Railways ownership (for about six weeks) although it had probably not actually done any work for two or three months.

No Sentinel railcars now exist in the UK but there are three in Sri Lanka, one of which is the subject of longstanding efforts at restoration. However, the same mechanism was used in some small shunting engines - also bought by the LNER - and one of these is preserved by the Middleton Railway in Leeds."

Yorkshire Water complaint

You may remember that in May we had two seven-day periods of low water pressure, which meant that for many in the village power showers didn't work and, in some cases, high level cisterns and hot water header tanks didn't fill either.

To make matters worse, all of us who complained were told that we were the only complainant, that we should try turning our stopcock off and on, and they could get an engineer out in about ten days.... I lodged a complaint with Yorkshire Water (YW), followed it through all three stages of their Complaints Procedure where they tried to fob me off with untruths, and then on to the Consumer Council for Water (CCW).

They produced a Third-Party Consent form which many of us signed to release tapes and transcripts of what we were told. CCW took these to YW, but YW refused to release the evidence, insisting that everyone should have gone through the three-stage procedure and on to CCW individually.

They cited Data Protection despite the Third Party Consents. This was of course nonsense as only I was making the complaint, & the rest was supporting evidence. CCW at this stage admitted they had no teeth

and couldn't compel YW to come clean. They suggested I contact the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) to see if they could help. After some discussion the ICO said that if YW refused to divulge my information they could help, but not for other people's data. Hmm.

The next step was to contact our local MP Lee Pilcher, who my research showed had worked for YW for over 20 years before entering politics.

I had a long meeting with him down in his Constituency Office in Ackley, and he has agreed to take on the case, stating that this was not how YW operated when he was there, and agreeing it wasn't right or fair. I am preparing a full dossier for him, which with his 'inside knowledge' will hopefully yield results. Big companies should not be able to indulge in institutional lying and treating their customers with such contempt.

That is where we are at present, I will keep you updated with progress!

Final: P14 - P13 following sheer determination and torrential rain and another driver DSQ saw me finish and place P13 out of 16.

Overall not my most successful outing, however, placing 11th out of 25 entries year of proper competitive overall in SUPERONE and only 12 points of seeded numbers wasn't bad for my first racing!

Onwards to what lies in store for me next year, and also finish off my club rounds this

year, and maybe a winter series or two.

Yes so we've finished SUPERONE now, and I came 11th in the championship out of 25 entries so not bad for my first year of national racing in a huge championship!

I am still doing our Fulbeck sprint series which runs till November, but currently in vice champion position so keeping my fingers crossed for this as I could, if I play my cards right get number 1 by the end of the season!

Over winter I'm going to be testing at more big tracks and trying to get out of my safety zone and to get me ready for next year, as the plan is to do motorsport UK next year 'The Kart Championship'

A message from the Vicar

To St Luke, a Gentile, we owe the beautifully written Gospel of Luke, and the Book of Acts. He was a Greek physician, a disciple of St Paul, a companion on some of his missionary journeys, and an inspired writer.

Luke's gospel focuses on the compassion of Christ. His gospel contains some of the most moving parables, such as the Good Samaritan and Prodigal Son. This, with his emphasis on poverty, prayer and purity of heart, make up much of his appeal to the Gentiles, for whom he wrote.

Women figure more prominently in Luke's gospel than any other: look out for the extended story of the Virgin Birth, and stories

of Mary, Elizabeth, and the woman who was a sinner.

In Acts, Luke is remarkably good at linking sacred and profane history, as subsequent archaeology has shown. A principal theme of his Acts is how the early Christians moved away from Jerusalem into the pagan world, and especially on to Rome.

Luke is the patron saint of doctors, surgeons and artists (due to his picturesque style of writing). His symbol is an ox, sometimes explained by reference to the sacrifice in the Temple at the beginning of his Gospel. In England 28 ancient churches were dedicated to him.

As we remember St Luke this month, let's note that one of the major themes in his gospel is prayer. Jesus tells the Parable of the Friend at Midnight (Luke 11:5-8) in the context of teaching His disciples to pray (1).

Pray Shamelessly:

In the parable a man approaches his friend at midnight and asking: 'Friend, lend me three loaves, for a friend of mine has arrived on a journey, and I have nothing to set before him' (5-6). Despite the hour, the rules of hospitality mean that this is not an unreasonable request. Jesus says, 'though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, yet because of the man's boldness he will rise and give him whatever he needs' (8). Jesus is telling us to approach our heavenly Father in 'shameless boldness' with our needs. As adopted children we should have no hesitancy in coming to talk with our Father. It is not God who is reluctant to answer, but we to ask. Do we pray with shameless boldness?

Pray Persistently: Like children we should be persistent in our requests: 'Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you.' (9). All three verbs indicate a continual habit: 'Keep on asking...seeking...knocking'. We will not be content simply to ask once and then move on. Jesus tells us to bring our prayers to God persistently. Do we give up too easily in prayer?

Pray Expectantly: 'For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened.' (10). Are we expectant in our prayers, believing that

God delights in meeting our requests? Why not begin this adventure of prayer today!

Charity 5k & 10k run on 14.9.25
Garthorpe Annual 5K/10K Fun Run Race
Report

A Perfect Morning for Running in Memory of
Dave Hanney

Sunday 14th September dawned bright and clear in the charming village of Garthorpe, setting the perfect scene for the annual 5K/10K Fun Run. Blessed with sunny and dry conditions throughout the morning, runners gathered at St Mary's Church on Shore Road to participate in this special memorial event honouring Dave Hanney, fondly remembered as a "Goole Viking Striders Legend."

The event, organized in aid of the charity Lymphoma Action, welcomed runners of all abilities with registration on the day and the modest £5 entry fee going entirely to charity. The atmosphere was festive, with tea, coffee,

cake, and a raffle adding to the community spirit that makes this village race so special.

The 5K race kicked off at 9:30 AM with an impressive field of 38 runners taking on the scenic course. 10K Race Results - 11:00 am Start

After a brief interval allowing for refreshments and cheering on the 5K finishers, the 10K field assembled for the 11:00 AM start. This longer distance attracted 33 determined runners ready to test themselves over the challenging course.

The 10K race delivered drama from start to finish, with Liam Tupling emerging victorious after a closely fought battle. His winning time of 38:46 was just 10 seconds ahead of Jonathan Frary (38:56), making for an exciting sprint finish. Ross McDonnell, who had also competed in the 5K earlier, showed remarkable endurance to claim third place in 39:48.

The women's 10K race was equally competitive, with Kathy Nicholson leading the field home in an impressive 47:30, followed by Kasia Szalecka (48:06) and Nina McDonald (49:42) - Nina remarkably completing a double after her 5K performance earlier in the morning.

Special mention must go to Colin Byard, who earned recognition as "Top Oldie" with his time of 47:04, proving that age is just a number when it comes to running.

Review of Simply Dylan, Garthorpe Village Hall, 23rd August 2025.

Simply Dylan returned to Garthorpe after a storming concert two years ago which left the audience shouting for more. So, what can you say about the band on their revisit that isn't just repetition?

Firstly, this was a very different gig from the one in 2023. The band came as a four-piece, the electric guitars of John O'Connell and Treva Goldup replaced with semi-acoustic and mandolin, supported by Alec Pearson on Bass and a quite brilliant violinist from the Liverpool Philharmonic Rachel Jones.

Secondly, in 2023 the set list was made up from the songs you'd expect to hear, 'the greatest hits' almost. This time we heard perhaps the songs the band enjoyed performing, and it showed. Only a few numbers remained from 2023, most notably 'The Hurricane' showcasing Rachel's superb violin playing. Yes there was 'Tangled up in Blue', 'Forever Young' and 'Like a Rolling Stone', but there was also 'The Ballad of Hollis Brown' and 'When the Ship Comes in' from the 1963 album 'The times they are a changin'', and 'To Ramona' and 'My Back Pages' from 1965's 'Another side of Bob Dylan'. There was also a good and unexpected version of 'The Mighty Quinn', written by Dylan but taken up the charts by Manfred Mann. So a lighter, more acoustic concert, performed with feeling, commitment and humour, and even better than 2023. Great musicianship, great entertainment.

We are not a profit-making organisation and have to constantly factor in the hire of halls, materials needed and the cost of the professional tutors. The other craft workshop takes place on 26th September and is the making of a dried flower wreath. The workshop involves learning how to dry all the plants involved as well as the actual making of the wreath.

The second cake decorating of the series took place on 5th Sept and the sugar roses and leaves that were produced were excellent. Once again what a talented lot you are in the Marshlands. This was followed the next day at

Garthorpe Village Hall by Fruit infusions. It should have been the second Elder Experience but due to the lack of Elderberries this year the programme had to be tweaked slightly. Watch out for the Elder(berry) Experience next year at this time.
